### African guest lecturers

Gabriele Medici, political science student, University of Zurich:

"I do not doubt that it is possible for any scholar to achieve a very high level of knowledge in any geographical context, regardless of where they come from. But a person who was born, grew up, and lived in such a context can more fully grasp its characteristics, which would be impossible for an outsider. I am not saying that without this experience one cannot understand, or talk about Africa, quite the contrary! But discussing Africa with someone who grew up there certainly brings something extra."

# Internship opportunities for students from Switzerland
